DBHDS- Background Investigations Unit (BIU)	MH/SU/DD	Under §§37.2-416 and 416.1 of the Code of Virginia, every DBHDS- licensed provider shall require any applicant who accepts employment in a direct consumer care position or supervises a direct consumer care position to undergo a fingerprint based national criminal background check. Private providers who have received preliminary approval by the Office of Licensing of their licensing application policies, procedures and forms, may then register with the Background Investigations Unit as referenced below. Under §37.2-408.1 every DBHDS- licensed Children's Residential facility is required to conduct fingerprint- based criminal history for all employees, students, interns, volunteers, and contractors. The results of these background checks must be received prior to permitting an applicant to work. All DBHDS licensed providers (Adult and Children) are required to initiate checks of child abuse and neglect for applicants through the Virginia Department of Social Services (VDSS) Central Registry.
